

Library Remodel is Now a Reality!

fter many years of hoping, dreaming and planning (and dozens of book sales!), the Morro Bay Friends of the Library is moving forward

with a complete interior remodel project for the Morro Bay Library, slated to commence in spring early 2013. What makes this project unique is the that fact it completely funded and driven by volunteers community supporters. More than \$250,000 has been raised from hundreds of donors and thousands of purchases at the Friends' quarterly book sales through the years.

The Remodel Committee and architect Shana Reiss are putting in countless hours to keep the project moving forward.

The remodel project will encompass a complete redesign of the entire 6,500 sq. ft. interior space within the current footprint of the library building. This renovation will create a single unified space which will consolidate and centralize the circulation area to allow greater visual control over the entire space. A primary goal is to create spaces that meet the needs of a variety of age groups in ways that welcome participation by all

members of our community. A better use of technology is also part of the plan. The remodel committee and architect are working toward a common vision of

> creating a library that is welcoming, open, flexible, inclusive, technologically current, and reflective of our community.

With the blessing and assistance of County personnel, the Friends' remodel committee interviewed several local architectural firms over the summer and selected Shana Reiss of Reiss Design Studio (Paso Robles) to design the new library.





Meet Shana Reiss, the architect who will design our new library space. We thought you'd like to know more about her background and her passion for our library remodel project.

What makes you especially suited to a project like the library?

I am driven to design projects that have a lasting impact that is greater than simply designing a structure. I strive to always have a project in "the works" that allows architecture to be a conduit for changing the world and impacting lives. I believe that the Library fulfills this requirement that I have set for myself (and Reiss Design Studio) because of the long-term and far reaching impact potential for literacy, inspiration, and resource availability to the library patrons.

I have a technical skill set that also compliments the project. I am LEED Accredited - meaning that I have been designated as being well versed in "green design." It is important for this project to maintain high indoor air quality, natural lighting, and an overall healthy experience for the staff and patrons. I will also be focusing on spatial layouts that maintain important adjacencies and maximize the available footprint of the building.

How is this library project different from other projects you work on?

I have spent much of my career designing wineries. Wineries are typically new construction and large-budget projects. These projects, while different from the Morro Bay Library, have provided excellent experience to draw from. Spatial planning is the most important element of the library. The spaces and adjacencies are complex and if not done correctly, the building will not function correctly. This project has a limited budget, so there will be an exciting challenge of selecting materials and creating 'wow' elements by using creativity rather than a big pocketbook. This project is special because the end-user is the community and the project is funded with community funds - this requires the highest level of stewardship and involves resolving a multitude of concerns for a vast clientele.

What are you most looking forward to on this project?

Providing a space that the community and the MBFOL are proud of. I would like to design a space that will remain relevant for many years as a functional library and as a special experience for patrons. I have also enjoyed working with the dedicated team of volunteers on the remodel committee.

What do you enjoy about being part of the central coast community? I was raised on the Central Coast and attended Cal Poly, which truly makes the Central Coast home to me. I really enjoy the outdoor options we have available to us... one of my favorite activities is hiking with my dog, Bode. My favorite local hikes are Cerro Alto and Blinn Ranch.

Do you have any personal connection to books and/or libraries that you'd like to share?

I grew up in Atascadero, so that was the library that I frequented. I have always enjoyed reading and felt that libraries were special. Growing up I designed two-story home libraries for my dream home - since then I have reduced the scale of my dream home library to about three bookcases. There is nothing quite like getting lost in a good book. Being able to spend a day or more entering a different world (versus a couple of hours watching it on TV) makes reading a very luxurious activity for me. I look forward to it and am delighted when I find a book that I cannot put down. I prefer fiction, but have recently embraced business-related non-fiction. My favorite books are A Thousand Splendid Suns and Harry Potter.

Nine Reasons to Save (and Support) Public Libraries

Editor's Note: The following is an excerpt from an article by Emmily Bristol. I hope that as a supporter and lover of public libraries you will appreciate this reminder of why our libraries are integral to the success of our broader society and our local communities. It was President John F. Kennedy who made this plea for the sanctity of our libraries:

"If this nation is to be wise as well as strong, if we are to achieve our destiny, then we need more new ideas for more wise men reading more good books in more public libraries. These libraries should be open to all except the censor. We must know all the facts and hear all the alternatives and listen to all the criticisms. Let us welcome controversial books and controversial authors. For the Bill of Rights is the guardian of our security as well as our liberty."

Here are some reasons why our libraries are still the place where we as a nation will achieve our destiny:

- 1. The house of the 99%: The foundation of democracy is an educated electorate. When the economy is down, it is all the more vital that we the people have access to information, education, news... and now in modern times the internet, computers, and other sources of media tools as well. Libraries do that. For everyone.
- 2. Libraries build equity: Research shows that depressed neighborhoods and declining communities are not just culturally enriched by libraries. The institutions serve as a community focal point, like a town square, and communities that have that resource rebound.



hope chest: Libraries don't just curate the Harry Potter series and lend copies of the latest blockbusters on DVD, they also house special collections based on the needs and unique identities of

4. Renewable resource: How much do you save by being able to borrow materials from the library? How helpful is it to have this resource — especially now that even retail bookstores, movie rental shops, and record stores are closing?

5. Literacy: Studies show that children's literacy is greatly improved by access to summer reading programs and preschool reading programs at public libraries. And children's literacy is a building-block of adult literacy[...] There are very few individuals who could buy every child a book and start them on the road to literacy.. [...] But all of us together can buy a kid a building full of books. That is a miracle.



- 6. Leveling the playing field: Libraries offer vital resources for communities that might not otherwise be served or feel integrated. People learning English (or other languages), the elderly, deaf people, the homeless... the list goes on.
- 7. Safe space: In some communities, the public library may be the only free space available that is also a safe space. Young victims of bullying, kids who live with domestic violence, LGBT youth, and many more can find a safe place (and often a caring librarian) at the library.
- 8. Cultural touchstone: Many libraries showcase art often by local artists. Likewise, the buildings themselves are often architecturally significant and enhance the beauty and character of the communities they serve.
- 9. Drop in or drop out: Libraries can also be a place that means the difference between a child's success or failure in school. Many libraries offer tutoring programs, free classes, as well as access to volumes of information and technology that a kid might not have anywhere else. Even in these modern times there are kids who don't have computers at home who need to type their papers for school[...] Libraries can make the difference to a kid teetering on the edge.


